



Write an essay to answer these questions:

- · What was the most significant event of the Cold War & why?

Student's Answer

The Cold War was an everything-but-official war between the Western and Eastern Blocs, most prominently the United States and the Soviet Union. It began almost immediately after the ending of WWII primarily due to rising tensions between the two countries over extreme differences in ideology that had been building for many years prior. As a result of these rising tensions, the two countries began to stockpile nuclear weapons in preparation for nuclear war, which caused mass fear among the citizens of both nations, and overall, made matters worse.

The war caused several domestic issues within the United States, with one being the rooting out of Soviet espionage within the United States. A great example of this would be Joseph McCarthy, who throttled already-high American fears by publicly announcing that he had a list of Communists working within the government, which led to several controversial events, notably witch hunts against people on the list. Another domestic issue was the fear of a looming nuclear war among American citizens. In reaction to these fears, many Americans built underground nuclear shelters that were capable of withstanding a nuclear blast. All together, millions of Americans built these types of shelters, which showed how deeply felt this fear was among citizens.

The war also caused a plethora of issues abroad, with one of the biggest and longest-lasting of these being the Vietnam War. In this war, the ideologies of capitalism and communism fought through the U.S. and South Vietnam and U.S.S.R., and North Vietnam respectively. Although there was never any actual military engagements specifically between the U.S. and U.S.S.R., they fought indirectly through the implementation of aid to their respective allies. The U.S., under foreign policy that was highly against the spread of Communism, even sent troops to Vietnam. This war lasted throughout the 50s, 60s, and 70s, as neither side was prepared to back down. Another very similar event was the Korean War. This situation was almost identical to the Vietnam War, as the U.S. and U.S.S.R. fought indirectly through the aiding of their respective allies, this time those allies being South and North Korea. This war was also shorter than the Vietnam War, as it only lasted from 1950-1953.

Probably the most significant event in the Cold War was the Cuban Missile Crisis. In this crisis, the U.S. under the JFK administration refused to take nuclear missiles out of Turkey. In response to this, the U.S.S.R. placed tactical nuclear missiles in Cuba hat were ready to strike. It was at this point that the world was the closest to nuclear annihilation that it has ever been. Thankfully however, the situation was diffused when a deal for the U.S. to remove missiles from Turkey was agreed upon. Although it didn't end in a catastrophe, the Cuban Missile Crisis served as the climax of the Cold War.

WHAT TO ASK:

Exploratory questions
Challenge questions
Relational questions
Diagnostic questions
Action questions
Cause-and-effect questions
Extension questions
Hypothetical questions
Priority questions
Summary questions

PITFALLS TO AVOID:

Asking too many questions at once
Asking a question and answering it yourself
Failing to probe or explore the implications of answers
Asking unconnected questions
Asking yes/no or leading questions
Ignoring or failing to build on answers



PRACTICE 4: FEEDBACK AND ASSESSMENT



Compliment Sandwich

- start with a bit of praise
- then to give a bit of criticism
- and to finish with a bit more praise

MORE IMPORTANT IN FEEDBACK:

- Begin with a **FACT** A fact is rarely controversial, so it's a great way to start your assessment.
- **Focus on a simple, direct, clearly-stated fact**
- Assess: State what you value (where the post does well and where it is lacking)
- CALL TO ACTION: Explain what concrete action the student can take to improve

DON'T GET DISCOURAGED

FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT –

some time to meet your
expectations for the
discussion posts



REVIEW

- 1. Explain your expectations
 - Remember posting a video can be very beneficial
 - Rubrics are wonderful tools to illustrate your expectations and close the loop by providing clear feedback to students
- 2. Strategize your plan and ask appropriate questions
 - What materials do you want students to review?
 - What Learning Objectives do you want to accomplish?
 - ASK GOOD QUESTIONS!!!
- 3. Be an active participant
 - Model good behavior
 - Engage students
- 4. Provide Timely, Concise Feedback and Assessment with a CALL TO ACTION
 - Reinforce your expectations
 - Praise good work
 - Clearly state areas needing improvement
- 5. Be willing to try new approaches
